Southside Virginia Bottle Collectors' Fair



Vendors continue to sign up for what will be one of the museum's largest events of the year! With a few weeks left until the Southside Virginia Bottle Collectors' Fair, most of the available booth slots have now been reserved by collectors throughout Virginia.

In just two weeks' time, bottle and antique collectors from all over the Commonwealth of Virginia will be able to buy, sell, display and trade cherished vintage bottles, fruit jars, and general glassware at the South Boston - Halifax County Museum of Fine Arts and History. Visitor Admission to this event is \$5 per person. Children under 12 are free with a parent. Also featured during the show will be a special guest lecture by Anthony Townsend, Vice-President of the Richmond Area Bottle Collectors Association, on the production of soda bottles in Virginia.

Tony grew up on a dairy farm in Hampton, Virginia, which sparked his interest in antique milk bottles. He was later involved in digging and archeological pursuits during the city's infrastructure and renovation projects in the late 60s and 70s. Tony has been a resident of Chesterfield County since 1977 and has contributed his knowledge and time to the hobby of bottle collecting at both the national and local level. Tony is currently serving as the Vice President of the Richmond Area Bottle Collectors Association, a nonprofit group which has been in existence for over 40 years. The club meets regularly during the year and also sponsors a show in early October. He and his son Phillip enjoy lecturing on the topic together!
